



GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

Our oldest son is deaf. I vividly remember watching him notice sounds for the first time in the days after his cochlear implant was activated: the "caw" of a crow, a doorbell, the low rumble of the furnace kicking in. Our job as parents was to provide a running commentary to help him understand the meaning of each sound that so many of us take for granted: "See the birds? That is a crow!" "Your dad is home." "The heat is coming on." I'm reminded of those early days when I read Mark's account of Jesus restoring hearing to the deaf man. While most of us can hear, so often we take the sounds all around us for granted or relegate them to background noise – including the Scripture we hear at Mass each week. As Bishop Robert Barron writes, "This deaf man stands for all of us who do not hear the word of God, who have grown oblivious to it." As we listen to today's readings, we can ask Jesus to open our ears and our hearts to the word of God.



GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

Mark spares no detail in describing Jesus' encounter with the deaf man who had a speech impediment. Jesus places a finger in his ear and spits, touching his tongue, then utters the word "Ephphatha! ("Be opened") Immediately, the man can hear and speak clearly. When listening to this reading, I often focus on the man's hearing. But Jesus also cured the man's speech impediment, which I think indicates we're not supposed to just hear God's word, we are to speak to it, and speak of it. Once we allow Jesus to open our ears and hearts to the Good News, sharing it will begin to come naturally. There may still be times when our Catholic tongues feel tied, but "Be strong, fear not!" Jesus will give us the words.



ACTIONS Next time you take a drive, listen to the day's Scripture readings. Ask Jesus to open your ears and hearts to his words and show you how best to share them with others. And most teachers would agree: The more senses we engage, the more we take in. If you have trouble following the readings at Mass, open your missalette and read along silently.



Dear Parishioners,

In this weekend's Gospel, Jesus opens the ears and loosens the tongue of the deaf-mute. Both he and the crowd can't contain themselves, but proclaim what Jesus has done. What has Jesus really done? Healed the man? Yes, but much more. Jesus has revealed that He is far more than a miracle worker, as fascinating and as wonderful as that may be. Understood as only an external sign, however, the miracle falls short of the reality. The miracles that Jesus performs reveal His own divine power, His own compassion for the human condition, and His own mission. Jesus cares for each one of us ... He cares enough to reach out and touch us! What must be proclaimed is not the sign itself, but to that to which it points: God's Presence bringing salvation (see the First Reading). Faced with this revelation, no one can keep silent. The Word grants the power of word.

We can surmise that something very profound must have happened between Jesus and the deaf-mute man even before the miracle brought the man to an intensified insight about Jesus. Jesus must have communicated something to him that resonated deep within the man's very being and ultimately changed him. This is why he couldn't help but proclaim the miracle – his encounter with Jesus changed him. He was able to see beyond the miracle to the wholeness (salvation) that Jesus offered him.

The crowd recognized that Jesus is the fulfillment of Isaiah's prophesy (see the First Reading) when they say, "He has done all things well. He makes the deaf hear and the mute speak." Jesus' miracle points beyond Himself as a miracle worker to Himself as the One who has come to save us. The miracles are a sign of salvation – God's new Life is breaking in on humanity and changing who we are and giving us a whole new insight into our relationship with God. We now see God's mighty deeds, know that Jesus is our Savior, and can proclaim God's salvation. This Good News can't be contained.

Jesus is very personal with the man He heals: He touches his ears and tongue and He prays to His Father ("looked up to heaven") with a groan, as if His whole being were involved. Just think how much He wishes to touch <u>us</u> ... to heal <u>us</u> ... to encounter <u>us</u>! Like the healed man and the crowd in the Gospel, we can't (and shouldn't) keep quiet, either. An encounter with Jesus should lead us to our proclaiming His nearness, His care, and His healing. We are never alone. We only need to open ourselves to Jesus' touch. We only need to open ourselves to the Word who grants us all power to proclaim His nearness to the whole world.

In terms of Christian discipleship, we must come to know Jesus before we can proclaim who He is. Looking to mighty deeds that we think may be unfolding around us today – reports of miracles, etc. – is not where this Gospel leads us. Rather, the Gospel leads us to see Christ in the little things around us – the caring touch, the encouraging smile, the unexpected friendly phone call – and to interpret these as evidence of God's Presence and salvation. We ought to be "astonished" today by the many manifestations of God's Presence in and through the people around us. We ought to be astonished at how God uses us as instruments to proclaim the Good News of salvation. We ought to be so keyed into Jesus' Presence that we, too, can't contain ourselves, but rather we must proclaim God's mighty deeds to anyone who has ears to hear.

May Saint Michael the Archangel protect, defend, guide, and intercede for us always!




