Illness tends to make people feel grumpy. When we don't feel good, we naturally turn inward upon ourselves. We want this to be all over. We want to feel good again and to get on with the tasks and challenges at hand. Prolonged illness keeps some people grumpy all the time, while a surprising number of other people seem to be able to rise above their pain and distress and, sometimes even because of it, reach out to others. I know individuals in both situations and while I keep the first group in prayer, the second group often amazes me. In this weekend's Gospel, Jesus is hanging on the cross. He was scourged, beaten, and crowned with thorns. It's pretty safe to say that He is in pain and distress. He's being "sneered at." He's being "jeered." He's being "reviled." Was Jesus at that point grumpy and did He turn inward upon Himself? NO!

Three individuals are hanging on crosses, suffering and dying ... one reviles, one begs for salvation, One promises Paradise. Indeed, only One can promise Paradise. Who but "the Christ of God" could make such a promise? Who but a divine King could reach beyond His own suffering and dying to bestow Life on another? Who but one totally innocent of evil could draw goodness out of one who is "condemned justly?" Three hang on crosses. One remains condemned. One is redeemed. One will rise from the dead ... our Lord Jesus Christ, the King of the Universe.

Although Jesus' Kingdom is established from the very beginning of creation (see the Second Reading from the Letter to the Colossians) and through the Davidic kingship (see the First Reading from the Second Book of Samuel), His reign is not one of power but of mercy, not one of self-service but of self-giving, not one of material wealth but of eternal salvation. His throne is a cross. Such a King the world has never seen. Through His suffering and death this King brings Life to all who are open to receive it. This King offers Paradise to all those who come to Him, accept His reign, and remain faithful to the will of His Father. This King remembers each of us and invites us to come into His Kingdom ... into the eternal Life He won for us.

The cross is where we least expect a king to be. Yet this is where we find Jesus. The cross is where we ourselves least want to be. Yet this is how God's Kingdom is established and where our discipleship begins: allowing ourselves to be crucified on the cross of self-giving. Jesus demonstrates His Kingship not by saving Himself, but by saving others. Jesus demonstrates His Kingship not by power but by loving assurance that Paradise awaits faithful disciples. Only by beginning here, on the cross, can our discipleship end like the Good Thief's, hearing Jesus say to us, "Amen, I say to you, today you will be with Me in Paradise."

The Good Thief said, "Jesus, remember me when You come into Your Kingdom." This Solemnity celebrates Christ as King. His Kingdom has come. We are living in God's Kingdom now. We are called, however, not to simply pay homage to our exalted King, but to do as He did. This means that each day we must live in a self-giving way because only through goodness expressed in reaching out to others is God's reign at hand. Living the Paschal Mystery means living the daily dying the cross demands. Just as the cross was the means to Jesus' exaltation, so is the cross our only way into Paradise. When self-giving seems to swallow us up and we are tempted to choose a self-serving attitude, all we need to do is remember that the cross is the door to Paradise. This only way – the cross – is the way out of this life, crossing into eternal life. The only way.

May Saint Michael the Archangel defend, guide, protect, and intercede for us always!

New Jersey Independent Victims Compensation Program

The Diocese of Camden – along with the other Roman Catholic dioceses in New Jersey – has established an Independent Victim Compensation Program (IVCP) to compensate those who, as children or young adults, were sexually abused by a priest of the Diocese.

The IVCP is independently administered by experienced victim compensation experts Kenneth R. Feinberg and Camille S. Biros.

The IVCP will handles the submission, evaluation and resolution of individual claims, and operates independently of the Diocese or any church-affiliated institution. The administrators of the IVCP have complete autonomy to determine the eligibility of a claim with the guidelines of the established Protocol. The amount of compensation for those who make a claim will be independently determined by the IVCP administrators. All victims – no matter when the abuse occurred – are eligible to participate, and all matters will be handled confidentially.

Victims of clergy sexual abuse of a minor can begin the process of utilizing the program by going to www.njdiocesesivcp.com and reviewing the protocol for submitting a claim.

Bishop Sullivan strongly encourages anyone who was sexually victimized by a priest of the Diocese to participate in the IVCP, and has asked that anyone who knows of someone who was abused to contact them so that they are aware of the IVCP and can participate in it.

THE 2020 MASS BOOK OPENS TUESDAY, DECEMBER 3, 2019 AFTER THE 9:00 AM MASS

We have revised our current policy regarding requests for Mass Intentions. Last year, people could initially request six (6) Masses, with three (3) of those Masses at the same time, e.g. Saturdays at 4:00p, Sundays at 10:45a, etc. This was to accommodate requests such as an anniversary of a person's passing, a special birthday or a similar intention which could be planned in advance. At the same time, we hoped this would also allow for more immediate requests which arise at the time of special prayers for someone undergoing surgery, or when someone dies, or a similar life-event.

Over the past year, there have been a number of open intentions during the week. <u>A weekday Mass offers the same graces for the person it is offered for as does a weekend Mass</u>. However, given the current trend, we have found it necessary to once again revise our policy for weekday and Sunday Masses.

- Anyone may request <u>any number</u> of Masses during the week. Weekday Masses may be requested for anytime in 2020.
- As of December 3rd, weekend Masses (Saturday at 4p, Sunday at 8a and 10:45a) are open through June 30, 2020.
- Weekend Masses for the second-half of the year (July 5th through December 27th) will become available Tuesday, April 28, 2020. Individuals may request two (2) weekend Masses January 5th through June 28th and two weekend Masses July 5th through December 27th).
- Mass requests will not be taken via e-mail or over the telephone.
- A <u>\$15 stipend</u> is due for each Mass intention at the time of the request.

In June 2020, if all the weekend Masses fill during the first half of the year, we will also begin to offer a multiple Mass intention (two individuals for one Mass) which will rotate through the weekend Masses (4:00p Vigil Mass, 8:00a Sunday Mass, 10:45a Sunday Mass.) Diocesan Policy allows for one Mass a week to be a multi-intentioned Mass.

This policy is necessitated as a result of people who only request weekend Masses at the opening of the Mass Book each year. We are fortunate to have five (5) weekday and three (3) weekend Masses celebrated here each week, but 12 or more Masses requested per individual quickly fills the Book, especially the weekends. Hence, by mid-Spring to early-Summer, our weekend Mass Intention book is almost full. Thus, if Parishioners die mid-year to year-end, often there are no announced weekend Masses available for up to a year after their death and this is greatly upsetting to the surviving members of the family.

Before deciding on the above policy, a survey of Mass Book Intention policies of several parishes in the area was made. Some Parishes only open their Mass Intentions a few months at a time. Some Parishes restrict the number of weekend and weekday requests that can be made in a given year. Many Parishes are struggling with the same issues that are being encountered here at the Parish of Saint Michael the Archangel.

We are doing all that is humanly possible to be fair and to accommodate everyone and to hopefully ensure that all of the Masses celebrated in the Parish have intentions.
